Ever since coming to Nebraska Christian, I have wondered why the

founders chose to open a school in Central City. To me, it didn't make a lot of sense due to the fact that not too far to the west were the cities of Grand Island, Kearney, and Hastings. To me, when choosing an area for a school, population base would be one of the more important criteria. Would there be enough local students? Would teachers and other staff come? Would students from a distance come to the school?

I recently met Orvil Hamer, one of NC's founders, and he spoke a little about my question. Orvil said that Central City wasn't the plan; the school could have been in Aurora, Scotia, or many other towns. The men didn't have a preconceived idea of where the school should be started. They prayed for a place for a school for several years, and when the campus that NC sits on today became available, they were able to work with the owners, and Nebraska Christian was established in Central City. These men were following God's leading and were obedient - even if to human reasoning it didn't make sense.

At a recent board meeting, Greg Epp led us in devotions. I heard just the message I need to hear-

Nebraska Christian Launches "The Next 50 Years" Capital Campaign

Over 350 students, parents, and community members gathered in the gymnasium on

February 6 to celebrate the launch of The Next 50 Years Capital Campaign at Nebraska Christian. The capital campaign earned its name because each of the three buildings to be renovated as part of the campaign—the gymnasium, the girls' dorm and the boys' dorm-was built 50 years ago.

The program opened with a video that reviewed the school's rocky start. Bernice Grantham, wife of J.L., one of the Founders, was featured as she remembered being willing to sign over her portion of the farm to keep the school going in its first years. Kenneth Taylor, 1961 alumnus and after that board member for over 20 years, recalled many "hand to mouth" times. Both agreed that the school stayed open only by the Lord's provision and much prayer.

NC Board Chairman Paul McHargue reviewed the current state of the school, which in the past few years has included a balanced budget and efforts to review the facilities to ensure that they're meeting students' needs. Campaign Chairman Mark McHargue then followed to explain the vision of the campaign: to prepare the school to serve students for The Next 50 Years.

Each of the buildings presented as part of the ambitious renovation will require a complete overhaul of basic systems such as electrical, plumbing, and HVAC. The bathrooms and kitchens in each building will be fully renovated, continued on pg. 3

For a guy with a desk job that focuses primarily on money and isolates me from students, it is a challenge

to remember that this is about people. So God gave me fifth period study hall. The students in my study hall all know my mantra: "If you must speak, whisper." Most of them think they must speak, and some of them don't seem to grasp the concept that, by definition, a whisper is an attempt to avoid being overheard. I'll admit it frustrates me sometimes. About the time that I start to feel indignant, I find myself drawn into an "unnecessary" conversation with a small group of students in which my contribution cannot honestly be called a whisper. Turns out I am just like them, and despite my advanced age, I can still recall being where they are now.

God has given this school a mission to assist the family and the church by providing a Christ-centered education, equipping students with a Biblical worldview and encouraging a love relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ. That mission has to involve people, including the students in my study hall.

It is important that each one of them knows there is a God who loves them and has proven that love in the person of his son. That truth is at the core of a Christ-centered education.

This God is not like us. I will continue to call them to an ideal that lies outside of myself and which I cannot perfectly model, but this God can rightfully say to all of us, "You therefore must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48). Part of having a Biblical worldview is being able to acknowledge the truth that we are not and cannot be perfect. As Paul put it in Romans 3:20, "For by works of the law no human being will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin."

Paul goes on to say, "But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it-the righteousness of God through faith in Christ Iesus for all who believe. For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith" (Romans 3:21-25). A proper response to this gift is to love God and enjoy him forever. John says it this way in I John 4:19, "We love because he first loved us."

If the students in my study hall grasp these truths, then I would say the mission of Nebraska Christian Schools has been accomplished in their lives. I would also want them to share those truths. I would say that they must speak, and I would pray that they would do so in something more than a whisper.

it's amazing how God works! Greg began with the question, "Why Central City?" He shared that sometimes God's leading doesn't make logical sense, and we are confronted with a dilemma – do we do things man's way or God's way?

In our right minds, we would never write the script the way He writes it:

You shall march around the city, all the men of war going around the city once. Thus shall you do for six days. Seven priests shall bear seven trumpets of rams' horns before the ark. On the seventh day you shall march around the city seven times, and the priests shall blow the trumpets. And when they make a long blast with the ram's horn, when you hear the sound of the trumpet, then all the people shall shout with a great shout, and the wall of the city will fall down flat, and the people shall go up everyone straight before him.

— Joshua 6:3-5

Why would the Israelites do this? It doesn't make sense. Do you think the people in Jericho were scared watching this? Probably not until the walls began coming down.

Another example of God's leading seeming illogical is found in Judges 7:2-4, 8:

The Lord said to Gideon, "The people with you are too many for me to give the Midianites into their hand, lest Israel boast over me, saying, 'My own hand has saved me.' Now therefore proclaim in the ears of the people, saying, 'Whoever is fearful and trembling, let him return home and hurry away from Mount Gilead." Then 22,000 of the people returned, and 10,000 remained. And the Lord said to Gideon, "The people are still too many. Take them down to the water, and I will test them for you there, and anyone of whom I say to you, 'This one shall go with you,' shall go with you, and anyone of whom I say to you, 'This one shall not go with you,' shall not go." So the people took provisions in their hands, and their trumpets. And he sent all the rest of Israel every man to his tent, but retained the 300 men. And the camp of Midian was below him in the vallev.

It doesn't make sense to us that the Israelites would cut their army down to 300 men. They probably wondered themselves, but they trusted and obeyed. God did not want them boasting in their strength and their power. He had them blow trumpets and break jars, and because they were obedient, He delivered a victory over the Midianites.

In the New Testament, God's son, Jesus, is born into a common worker's family. The King of kings and Lord of lords is sent to die. He chooses fishermen to spread the Good News. It is not how we would have done it, but it is how God chose to work.

So why do you build a school in Central City? Because God opened doors, and NC's founders chose to follow, knowing that God was the only one who could make it work. If He makes it work, then He gets all the glory.

Glory to God.
