Each spring, one of my favorite days is when we open campus up

for students and parents thinking about NC to come and see us for themselves. This year, Campus Preview Day was held on April 8th. Our guests get to listen to our choir sing; we have some students lead tours; other students sit on a panel to answer questions; and a few of us talk about the school and its mission, the history of NC, academics, and our activities. I enjoy getting a chance to talk about Christian education, why the school was founded, and why we do what we do.

This year I asked two of our teachers to talk about what it means for them to be able to teach Biblical truths through their subjects. I thought their responses were so encouraging that I want to share some of what they said with you. I asked Dee Flynn and Carl Ostrand to share with our Advance readers what they shared on that day.

Dee Flynn teaches our upper level science classes and has taught at Nebraska Christian for seven years. Dee is our Quiz Bowl coach and has served as a dorm parent in the past.

"I appreciate being able to teach science at Nebraska Christian because I am able to approach science as a way

Elge Wins State Wrestling Title


Sophomore wrestler Jaydon Elge completed his season undefeated (37-0) when he beat Drew Loberg of Randolph 16-4 to win the Class D 138-pound title. Elge also qualified for state as a freshman, placing fourth in the same weight class.

Elge has been around wrestling for his entire life—his father, Terry Elge, has been the NC wrestling coach since the program's debut in 1998—but he clearly remembers the moment he decided to become serious about wrestling. "When I watched my brother Isaac [Elge '12] win, I decided I wanted to be a state champion, too," he said.

Elge's dedication to the sport is quite evident. During the season,

he arrives at school at 6:15 each morning and works out until 7:30. Then he has practice after school from 4:15-6:45. In the off season, he lifts every morning and works out for two or more hours each night. This summer, he will wrestle in freestyle and greco competitions in Iowa, Ohio, North Dakota, and Oklahoma. His goal, beyond winning state championships his junior and senior years of high school, is to become an NCAA Division I national champion and Olympic wrestler.

Two other NC wrestlers qualified for state: sophomores Juan Lasso (120-pound) and Jeremiah Ebel (132-pound). Neither placed at the state meet.

On Wednesday, March 25, the speech team traveled to Minden to compete in the C2-4 district meet. The other schools at the meet were Amherst, Axtell, Blue Hill, Elm Creek, Franklin, Har-

vard, Hastings St. Cecilia, and Ravenna.

Of the team's 14 entries, 11 received medals for placing in the top six. Eight of those entries placed in the top three, qualify-

ing for the Class C-2 state meet, and three entries became the district event champions: Taylor Van Pelt in extemporaneous speaking, Jessica Hilderbrand in persuasive speaking, and Alicia Kim and Grace Wu in duet acting.

The team won the district title with 288 points to runner-up St. Cecilia's 180 points.

At the state meet on March 27, none of the NC speakers advanced to the final round of competition, but they gave great performances and enjoyed the experience. Head Coach Charissa Smith ('94) said, "This was a great experience, especially for all our young participants, and what they learned here will benefit them for years to come."

Girls' Dorm

Construction on the Girls' Dorm is in overdrive this

summer. Much remains to be accomplished on both the interior and exterior of the building. The interior, at the time of this writing, is nearly empty. Walls will be framed, flooring installed, and everything required to make the building a home will happen in the next few months.

The building's pending completion is exciting, but even more exciting is what the Lord will do through the ministry that takes place inside the building. One of our international dorm alumni shared the impact of attending NC, which was made possible because of our dorm program: "I am so thankful to God that He has brought me here to this school, has saved me, has helped me to realize that He is above all things and that He loves me more than anything else. To have Jesus Christ with me is the best thing that has ever happened to me. I am glad that I got this opportunity to come here and be part of this



What's Next for The Next 50 Years Capital Campaign?

Water is the next major project for The Next 50 Years Capital Campaign. An interior fire-suppression sprinkler system is required in order to build the Girls' Dorm to current fire code requirements. We researched the possibility of building this system with our existing wells, but the cost is extremely prohibitive. Also, any additional renovation or new construction that happens on campus in the future will incur such costs again.

The alternative is to connect NC's campus with Central City's water system. This requires running a new, high-capacity water line from the city to campus, connecting the campus buildings to that water line, and disconnecting from our existing well. Our well can still be used for nonconsumption uses (like watering the

lawn), but any water to buildings or intended for human consumption will come from the city.

Although it is an extremely expensive initial cost, the benefits to NC for hooking up to city water are numerous.

Water supplied will be sufficient for any usage needs of future renovations or builds and will handle required fire suppression systems.

NC will no longer be required to extensively test our water, an annual expense that continually increases as more and more water tests are required.

Water pressure throughout campus will improve as the city lines will be built to handle the existing and future needs.

When problems arise with the water, the city will address the issue rather than us having to work inhouse to solve major water problems.

Bids and details of how the water will be connected on campus are still

to get to know God better. Science is the study of the physical world. According to Romans 1:20, God reveals His invisible qualities, His 'eternal and divine nature,' through His creation. We study Newton's first law in physics and physical science (among many other things!): 'Energy (and matter) is neither created nor destroyed, it only changes form,' which attests to God's finished work of creation. We look to God as a God of order as we learn about atomic structure and the precise way that atoms bond to form compounds in chemistry, marveling at the beauty of the design of matter on the atomic level. We study life in biology, seeing the Designer's hand in the intricacy of a cell. We are amazed together as we study inheritance and the genius of DNA. We look at the improbability of even one protein coming together on its own then realize how incredible is the idea that thousands of proteins all functioning together in an organism (there are over 100,000 different proteins in the human body) arose from nothing. His creation convinces us of not only His existence, but His character. He is a God of beauty—evolution without a Creator cannot explain beauty, or the love of beauty that God has given his image-bearers.

"Every other year, juniors and seniors are able to take Anatomy and Physiol-

ogy. This class explores the structures and functions of the human body. This class is a favorite with the students, even though it is a rigorous upper level science course. I love being able to say, 'Isn't God cool: look at this eye.' Students respond with awe for the human body and its Creator. Even lab reports contain words of praise for the Lord! Science in a Christian environment increases students' understanding of the God they serve."

Carl Ostrand teaches our upper level history classes, junior Bible, and Men of Vision. He has taught at NC for eight years, and he is also our head football and track coach.

"I teach American History and Government/Civics and had taught for quite a few years in public schools. Many of my students found history a little boring; even I did sometimes until I began teaching at Nebraska Christian. When you are able to view historical events and leaders as a connected story that the sovereign God of the universe is using, it is much more exciting and interesting than a few dates and cause-and-effect discussions. One theme we emphasize is that ideas have consequences. Teaching major historical events, such as World War *I, from the perspective of the depravity* of man, we see how idolatry, pride, and selfishness manifest themselves when

"I also coach football and track at NC. I love that we can talk about Biblical principals and how they relate to everything we do—even in football. Sports and the stress of competition show our character that we often can hide in normal day to day activities. I get to disciple and teach young men integrity, courage, service, and putting others ahead of themselves through sports."

I appreciate that Dee, Carl, and many other outstanding teachers and staff are pouring into students' lives at Nebraska Christian. It's amazing how teaching subjects from a Christian perspective changes what those subjects mean on a personal level to the students. Isn't it fun to see the hearts of Christian educators and the joy that teaching God's truths through their subject brings them? God is good.

being finalized, but the estimated cost is \$225,000-275,000. (The city sewer project undertaken in 2008 cost \$250,000) These kinds of infrastructure upgrades are extremely expensive, unseen underground, and absolutely necessary for the long-term sustainability of Nebraska Christian Schools.

This summer the water line will be run, and when the Girls' Dorm is completed, it and the rest of campus will be connected to the new city water line. The first of three payments over a two-year period is due to the city on August 1. Please consider giving to this unique and essential project.
