What's in a Name?



We recently dedicated our new girls' dorm. We felt it was important for the new building to have a name, instead of being called the "new building" or the

"girls' dorm." I asked a group of nine others to help choose a name to recommend to the Nebraska Christian School Board. These nine people represented different generations of NC alumni, as well as current parents, students, and staff.

The night we met, we began in discussing the importance of names. I used a blog from March 26th, 2014, that I had found on the Compassion website to open discussion.

I quoted from the blog, with a couple of slight changes. This is what I shared:

Names are important. They have power. They define us. They're more than a bunch of letters grouped together to sound pleasant to the ear. Names are more than a convenience allowing us to talk to each other. Names are a gift from God. They contain His power. They define things. They define us.

"A good name is more desirable than great riches; to be esteemed is better than silver or gold." – Proverbs 22:1 (NIV)

When it was time to begin generating ideas, the group decided it would be important to know what we hoped the feeling of the building would be. We discussed the importance of it being a home away from home. That it would be safe, an environment of love and caring. We wanted to stress the missional and disciple-making aspects that were to take place there. We hoped it would be a place for friends to gather, to love one another, to be patient and kind. A place where Christ-like traits were taught, learned, and shared. We hoped to choose a name that embodied these ideals.

Many words, ideals, and people were mentioned as possible names that might encompass some of the characteristics we hoped to see in the new building. We finally came to Elliot, as in Elisabeth Elliot. We weren't necessarily trying to honor the

Dorm's Long-Reaching Impact



At the dedication of Elliot Hall on March 18, Sherry (Masters '79) Dockweiler fondly remembered her time spend in NC's girls' dorms. Following are her remarks from that evening:

Forty years ago last fall (1975), I was able to come to Nebraska Christian from Iowa—because there was a dorm program. In fact, there were two girls' dorms and one boys' dorm. I stayed in Whittier Hall the first year with 13 other girls. Someone asked me at Christmas that year how I liked going to NC. I told him that it was like going to Bible camp every week! I was growing in my Christian walk, making friends, studying a lot, and having a lot of fun.

I remember that we could throw snowballs from the windows of our 2nd floor Whittier Hall dorm rooms at people coming out of the Ad Building. Don't worry, we didn't have very good aim. I also remember short-sheeting our friends' beds. And when we needed to study a little extra, we would get up early and study in one of the two little bathrooms in Whittier so our roommates could keep on sleeping.

My second year at NC, I moved into West Hall (the dorm our current dorm girls just moved out of). I still remember exactly what rooms I lived in, what color they were, and who my roommates were! I spent three years in West Hall, and I loved it. The dorm became my home away from home, and the girls became my extended family.

While I lived in the dorms, I learned a lot of lessons.

I learned to be a friend to many different girls. I still write to one friend who lives in Japan.

I learned to share. We had one phone for thirty of us, so a 10-minute limit was set. We also shared our clothes, our food, and even our flower bouquets.



What's in a Name? *continued from pg. 1* person Elisabeth Elliot, who passed away last June, but we hoped to use some of the things from her life as an example to all that live in and visit our dorm.

One of the most famous examples is her work with the Auca (Waodani) Tribe in Ecuador. Her husband Jim Elliot-along with Nate Saint, Roger Youderian, Peter Fleming and Ed McCully-was speared and killed in 1956 by the Aucas while trying to reach them with the Gospel. After the mens' deaths, the effort to reach the Auca Indians was not abandoned. Elisabeth Elliot and Rachel Saint, the sister of Nate, moved into the Auca village. There they learned the language and evangelized the tribe. Years later, the pastor of the tribe, one of the killers, baptized Nate's children. These women had been used by God to reconcile with the Aucas and bring them the ultimate reconciliation of Christ's salvation. The Auca Indians were able to accept the message of the Gospel because they were able to see forgiveness, reconciliation, and grace lived out.



author and a radio personality. She wrote over twenty books and hosted her radio program Gateway to Joy for thirteen years, with her famous line: "You are loved with an everlasting love, that's what the Bible says, and underneath are the everlasting arms." The travelingteam.org website has this to say about Elliot, "Elisabeth Elliot has become one of Christendom's most beloved and well-known lecturers and writers. She has been an encouragement and challenge to women in godliness, faithfulness and God's purpose in world missions. She wrote challenging one young woman, 'If indeed He is directing you toward missions, BE GLAD! He will show you His way in His own time."

Probably the thing that cemented this name as our top choice was when we looked up what the name Elliot means. Elliot is the Greek version of the Jewish name Elijah. When translated to English, it means "Jehovah is God." I can't think of a better way to dedicate a building to the Lord's service than by having that meaning with its name.

What's in a name? An awful lot.

Speech Team Places 2nd at Districts, Qualifies 7 Entries for State

The Nebraska Christian speech team had a phenomenal day at the C2-5 District Meet in Loup City on March 15. After going into the final rounds in fourth place, the team surged ahead to finish the day in second place with 272 points to District Champion Burwell's 274 points.

Each school is allowed to take 18 entries to districts (two each in nine



events). NC only took 14 entries and still placed ahead of several teams that were full with all 18 entries. Of NC's 14 entries, 11 broke finals, and 7 placed in the top 3 to qualify for State Speech in Kearney. Additionally, two entries–Makenna Loy in Serious Prose and Danae Burdett in Persuasive Speaking–were crowned event champions.

At the state meet, nearly all of the Nebraska Christian participants received superior ratings. Burdett was the only NC competitor to break finals, and she placed 2nd in persuasive with her speech on mental illness.
