# **Introduction of Educating Eagles**

We strive for this monthly newsletter to be consistent with the mission, vision, and purpose of our school. The hope is that you will see different ways the school is taking action to advance His kingdom. Let that sink in for a moment.

As Christians, we have the absolute privilege of being a part of what the Creator of the universe is doing. We are blessed. **Ephesians 4:12** captures this responsibility well when it says that we are given gifts in order "to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up." The original Greek word that is used for the word equip is **katartismos**. This Greek word translates literally as preparation, training, or equipping. This nails the purpose and existence of Nebraska Christian Schools. Parents partner with us to help prepare and train these students for life. As our vision states, we are here to "equip students to stand on Truth." Everything that we do should tie into this equipping ministry. Perhaps a familiar example might help bring this further to light.



Here in the heart of Nebraska, a majority of careers relate to agriculture. Let's go right to the root, and look at what it might take to equip a person to become a farmer. Farming crops requires an agricultural education to learn best practices of the industry. What are the best types of seeds to plant? When is the best time to plant? What types of soil promote healthy growth? What practices help to provide robust growth? You would, of course, need farmland to begin. Then you would need to take a balanced approach in using what the Lord has provided to you, to invest in the proper equipment and resources to make the farm operational.

For a farmer, this equipping takes time, energy, and money to complete. The same is true for our school when it comes to equipping students to stand on Truth. It takes resources (time, energy, and money) to carry out our mission, to impart a Christian Worldview through the provision of a Christian Education, and a focus on developing a love relationship with Jesus Christ. Importantly, even the time and energy provided by the school requires money. In today's ministry setting, money is the fuel that the Lord provides to help us be the hands and feet of Jesus. In our case, the primary focus includes partnering with the family and church in discipling and equipping the saints.

Nebraska Christian garners around ½3 of our annual income needs through yearly tuition. In order to foster a healthy ministry through NC's model of affordable tuition, we need generous ministry partners like you to help educate these Eagles. # **Great Success with the Read Live Program**

Read Naturally Live is a highly effective supplemental reading program that develops fluency and supports vocabulary and comprehension for young elementary students. Improving reading fluency is important for developing readers. Fluent readers read smoothly and easily— as if they were speaking. They read with few errors, seldom need to pause to figure out words, and read at a rate that supports good expression and comprehension. They also tend to comprehend better than nonfluent readers.

Nebraska Christian has participated in this program for the last three years. Each year, it has experienced great success. In the past year, seven of the ten students who took part in the program went from reading at one or more grade levels below grade level to reading at or above grade level!

Students love this program. It simultaneously bolsters their confidence and their comprehension, while providing concentrated help to students who may be behind their peers when it comes to reading in the classroom. With Read Naturally Live, the students are initially tested to determine what their beginning level of reading and comprehension is. They then select a nonfiction text from the assigned level, read it along with an audio recording, and then read it alone several times until reaching their goal. The entire program takes approximately one year to complete, and after that year is over, it quite often happens that students enjoy it so much, many don't want it to end.

This level of success could only be achieved due to the dedicated care and support provided by the wonderful team of elementary paraeducators here at NC. We are so thankful for all of their hard work and dedication to our children and this program.

# **Budget Corner**





I may have gotten a little too excited about the numbers last month. When I reported the general fund giving for July, I misclassified a capital campaign gift which made it appear that the general fund giving was way better than it actually was. The actual general fund giving for July was \$23,056 which was still almost \$10,000 ahead of the general fund giving for the same time period last year. August giving was down compared to last year. General gifts for the month totaled \$8,345, bringing the total for the year to \$31,401. This is just slightly behind last year's pace for the first two months of the fiscal year.

Here is what I know from years of watching God supply the needs of Nebraska Christian Schools. I am far too easily excited when God brings in gift income, and far too easily disappointed when he doesn't. Somehow, God continually makes a way to provide for His work, and He usually does it on a time table and in a way that gives Him glory, and prevents any of us from taking credit for it. I am grateful to God for his provision and

for each of you that He has chosen to use to provide support for Nebraska Christian Schools.


