She consistently works hard, maintaining a *Continued on page 3* Excitement abounds in the elementary building at Nebraska Christian School as fifth and sixth-grade students embark on a unique and educational journey raising rainbow trout, thanks to a wonderful opportunity provided by the State of Nebraska Game and Parks Department. The trout eggs, which arrived on campus on Thursday, January 25th, are now being attentively cared for by the eager students.

The project was made possible through a grant secured by the NC fifth-grade teacher, Mrs. Edson, covering the cost of the tank and all necessary accessories. The fifth and sixth graders have been actively involved in preparing the perfect environment for the trout eggs, testing the water quality and dutifully watching so it stays at the optimal temperature.



Mrs. Edson shared her enthusiasm for this project, stating, "The kids and I are so excited. We've been testing the water to make sure our tank is optimal for the trout eggs. Our chiller is hard at work keeping the water around 52 degrees."

The class received 200 eggs from the Nebraska Game and Parks Department, and within the first few days of having the eggs in the class tank, as of February 1st, approximately 50 have already hatched. The students are actively engaged in the various stages of the trout's life cycle, gaining valuable insights into the complexities of nature and God's perfect and fascinating design of these unique creatures.

Speaking with the fifth-grade students, their excitement was contagious. They

expressed their joy and eagerness to share their experiences and responsibilities in caring for the fish. The students have come to realize this project, initially focused on science, has expanded to encompass lessons in several different topics. Some of these topics include, how to be responsible along with other "classroom" lessons including math, and even art as they check the water's levels of nitrites, nitrates, and pH, among other factors with a color-coded chart. The students affectionately refer to it as "trout class."

Learning how to be good stewards of the earth is an integral aspect of the project and a key factor that Christians should actively pursue. The students take turns testing the water quality in the tank, a task they find enjoyable and educational. One student remarked, "It's fun to check the water and look at the colors of the pH levels," highlighting the interdisciplinary nature of their newfound responsibilities. But, beyond the scientific aspects, the students have been busy absorbing information about trout life cycles and interesting facts about the species. They've discovered

that trout eggs, in these early stages, need darkness for optimal growth, replicating their natural habitat under rocks in freshwater lakes or streams.

The students are diligently ensuring that the tank conditions remain prime for rainbow trout survival. With precise ratios of oxygen and a carefully regulated water temperature of 52 degrees, the fifth and sixth graders are fostering an environment where the trout can both survive and thrive. As the adventure unfolds, the students are eagerly anticipating the release of the young trout into a local Nebraska body of water in April or May of this year. Although they won't witness their fish grow to maturity, the students will have the opportunity to dissect a full-grown rainbow trout and gain further insights into their development later this spring, also thanks to the Nebraska Game and Parks.

Currently, the few young trout that have hatched are just under an inch long, and the students have already begun naming them, sparking friendly debates over names like Deacon or Eagle. Mrs. Edson shares in her students' excitement, expressing, "I think it's so cool to see God's intricate design with these fragile little eggs that will turn into large trout."

Each morning, the students eagerly check on their trout eggs, with Mrs. Edson noting, "This warms my heart." This hands-on project not only educates the young students about rainbow trout, their life cycle, and their environment but also instills a sense of wonder and responsibility as they play an active role in the life cycle of these fascinating creatures. The event not only highlighted the musical prowess of all of the students but also served as a platform for them to collaborate with other students from across the state.

The UNK Honor Band and Choral Clinic, with its diverse program and esteemed clinicians, provided an enriching experience for the participants. Clinicians and conductors for the event included Richard Mayne, Duane Bierman, Jessie LaBrie, Clayton Moyer, and Christian Yost, each bringing their expertise to guide the students toward musical excellence.




