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Equipped in Faith: Embracing Readiness in Sports, Education, and Christianity





Budget Corner

Here it is early March, and I am looking out my office window at what we are hoping will be the last snow of the season.

That window is in the newly renovated administration building. It is good to be back in familiar and yet very new surroundings. Please feel free to stop in, see the building, and visit with us. We would very much enjoy that.

I am nearing the end of my 40th year on staff at Nebraska Christian Schools, having spent a couple of years here as a student before that. I am constantly amazed at our God and His provision. I could see it as a student, as a teacher, but I can see it especially in the years I have spent as the business manager for the school.

Normally in this space, we would have a chart showing our goal for giving during the fiscal year, how much of that goal we had received so far, and how much of that goal we still needed to have come in. Because of the goodness of God, expressed generously through his people's donations at the end of 2023 and the beginning of 2024, we have met the goal that we had set for the 2023-2024 fiscal year. That means, among other things, that this year's depreciation expense, which our original budget did not account for, can be covered; that budgeting for next year may be able to take a serious run at trying to catch up to what the latest rates of inflation have done to the expenses of the school and to the expenses of the employees that work at the school; that our reserves, for the time being at least, can be put back to what financial advisors would recommend for an organization our size; and that our foundation can move forward with raising funds for the cafeteria project without having to be as concerned about competing with general budget needs. Please pray, as always, that we will be wise in how we use the resources that God gives us to accomplish the mission that God has given us.

To be sure the future will bring new needs, and, if the past is any indicator of the future, I like the Israelites of old, will be tempted to wonder how and if God will find a way to meet them. In His perfect timing, God will meet them in ways that I never would have imagined. I will be amazed that God did what God always does, and God will be amazed that I ever doubted that He would. It is part of a longer set of promises in Paul's instructions to Timothy from II Timothy 4, but I think about it often in this context: "If we are faithless, he remains faithful—for he cannot deny himself. Remind them of these things." Consider yourself reminded.

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

The school choir performs at important occasions on campus throughout the year and at the district music contest in April. The highlight of this group's work each year is the presentation of

This program includes a variety of sacred music, student testimonies, and a Scriptural challenge involving songs, poems, and narration. Emphasis is placed on musical quality, but more important than that is the emphasis on serving the Lord through a life that is clean and yielded to Him.

NC has scheduled choir programs in churches across the state the past two years. The choir travels by chartered bus during which time the young people have a chance to sleep, sing, and play games. Each choir program is preceded by prayer. This requires both time and effort on the part of the choir, but they feel that it is worthwhile.
