In this article, we will highlight the experiences of students who recently graduated from the Nebraska Junior Law Cadet Academy and those who attended the FCA Distance Camp at the University of Nebraska at Kearney. These students gained invaluable knowledge and skills while forging lasting memories and connections.

FCA Distance Camp

In another exciting endeavor, Eagle runners had the opportunity to participate in the FCA Distance Camp at the University of Nebraska at Kearney in June. This four-day camp brought together over 200 student-athletes from across the state, including Marlie Mundt (NC Class of 2023), who served as a huddle leader.

The FCA Distance Camp focuses on enhancing distance running skills while also emphasizing the spiritual aspect of running for the glory of God. The camp featured rigorous workouts, interactions with runners from various backgrounds, insightful speakers, uplifting music, and specialized training sessions. The athletes, including freshmen Abby Berck and Haddie Rankin, sophomores Eva Brumbaugh and Jacob Swanson, junior Noah Fischer, and seniors Heather Swanson and Grace Musgrave, shared an enriching experience that facilitated growth in both their athletic abilities and faith.







Nebraska Junior Law Cadet Academy

On June 23, 2023, at the Nebraska State Patrol Training Academy in Grand Island, 42 high school students got the chance to train like a trooper. The 26 male and 16 female junior law cadets successfully completed their training at the 53rd Nebraska Junior Law Cadet Academy. Rachel Hale, an NC junior from Fullerton, was among the proud graduates. The Junior Law Cadet Program, which selects participants through a rigorous application and interview process, offers students an immersive experience in law enforcement training.

"Junior Law is a great opportunity for high school juniors considering a career in law enforcement to experience part of the training our recruits go through," said Captain Andy Ecklund. The cadets delved into various aspects of law enforcement throughout the academy, including firearms training, K-9 handling, accident and criminal investigation, SWAT missions and responses, and state patrol car driving. Rachel expressed her enthusiasm, noting that the academy felt like a week packed into two days. She found the drug investigation session particularly interesting, while the cybercrime investigator session presented a challenging perspective on the impact of these crimes.

Rachel highly recommends the program to all high school juniors, emphasizing the fun-filled experience and the exceptional knowledge and inspiration provided by the Troopers. She extends her gratitude to The American Legion of Nebraska and the Nebraska State Patrol for sponsoring this transformative program.
