

Welcome to November. We have completed the first third of our fiscal year. We do not have the first third of what we anticipate we will need to meet our gift income budget for this fiscal year. That statement in and of itself is not remarkable. Our biggest gift income months have regularly been November-December (end-of-year giving) and March-April (auction), so if we did have one-third of our gift income already, I would consider us to be way ahead of schedule. What is surprising about the gift income numbers through October is how much lower they are when compared with last year. We are off 43% overall and 66% in the month of October. For sure, we will be analyzing the data to see if we can pinpoint the reason for that drop. Sometimes it is just the timing of one or more large

donations. But what will be more important for us and what I will encourage you to do with us is to ask God to do his will in, through, and with what looks to be a shortfall in gift income. Of course, for God this is not a shortfall, it is exactly what he knew we would have at this point.

We know that we have a mission here at Nebraska Christian Schools. Our mission is to assist the family and church in providing a Christ-centered education and encouraging a love relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ. We believe God gave us that mission, and so we trust him to support that mission. Pray that whatever God's will is in the midst of our current financial situation, we would be open to it and prove to be willing partners with God to carry it out. Thanks for your part in the prayer and financial support that God provides to enable us to fulfill the mission that he gave us.




